The state government is set to introduce a real-time digital monitoring system to track the implementation of welfare schemes and development programmes, with Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy pushing for technology-driven governance to improve accountability, transparency and effective service delivery.

Revanth Seeks Real-Time Monitoring Of Schemes

He will hold a review meeting with secretaries of all departments next week to finalise the modalities for launching the digital tracking system, which is aimed at ensuring better coordination among government departments to accelerate the implementation of flagship welfare and development programmes.

Sources said the proposed system will enable continuous monitoring of the progress of government schemes through an integrated digital platform, allowing the government to identify implementation gaps in real time and take corrective measures without delay.

The Chief Minister has directed officials to establish a digital dashboard that will provide detailed information on the targets, physical and financial

progress, implementation status and outcomes of all major government programmes. The dashboard will offer real-time updates from the gram panchayat level upwards.

In addition, the government has decided to set up a dedicated "Speed Cell" to monitor the execution of flagship schemes within deadlines. The Speed Cell will function as a central monitoring mechanism to ensure that bottlenecks are addressed quickly and decisions taken during review meetings are implemented without delay.

Chief Secretary Sanjay Jaju has directed all departmental secretaries to be fully prepared for the next week's meeting. Departments have been asked to compile detailed presentations on their achievements, ongoing projects, future targets and innova-

tive initiatives, besides documenting success stories that can be replicated across the state.

Sources said the real-time monitoring platform will be supported by IT and data professionals who will analyse implementation data on a daily basis and provide actionable inputs to senior officials. The system is expected to generate regular performance reports, flag delays, identify underperforming districts or departments and facilitate faster decision-making through evidence-based governance.

Officials said the technology-driven initiative is intended to strengthen monitoring of government programmes, improve inter-departmental coordination and ensure that the benefits of welfare schemes reach eligible beneficiaries within prescribed timelines.

Noted Actor Pradeep Rawat Passes Away at 74

MUMBAI: Renowned actor Pradeep Singh Rawat, best known for his iconic villainous and character roles across multiple film industries, passed away on Tuesday following a heart attack at his residence here. He was 74.

Born in Delhi in 1952, Rawat carved out a prolific career spanning Telugu, Hindi, Tamil, Kannada, and Malayalam cinema, alongside appearances in several Doordarshan television series. While he gained early recognition primarily as a main antagonist, he later transitioned seamlessly into character roles.

Telugu Journey Began with 'Sye' Rawat made a sensational Tollywood debut with the Nithiin-starrer and S.S. Rajamouli directorial Sye (2004). His chilling performance as the antagonist 'Bhikshu Yadav' earned widespread acclaim and established him as a sought-after villain in Telugu cinema.

He went on to feature in a string of major Telugu blockbusters, including Bhadra, Andarivadu, Chatrapathi, Lakshmi, Stalin, Desamuduru, Yogi, Jagadam, Ghajini, Maska, Oyl, Rebel, Naayak, Baadshah, 1: Nenokkadine, Alludu Seenu, Nenu Sailaja, Sarrainodu, Nene Raju Nene Mantri, Jai Lava Kusa, and Waltair Veerayya, among others.

Bollywood Stint and Awards His Hindi film journey began as early as 1985 with a brief role in Raj Babbar's Aitbaar. Over the years, he appeared in numerous Bollywood films, occasionally securing promi-



nent roles. His latest movie release was Gayapadda Simham.

For his memorable performance in Sye, Rawat won the Filmfare Award for Best Villain (Telugu), the Santosham Best Villain Award, and the prestigious Nandi Award in 2004.

No third-party insurance cover, no fuel: Supreme Court asks Centre to launch pilot project

New Delhi, August 4

Noting that nearly 56 per cent of vehicles on Indian roads lacked a valid insurance, the Supreme Court on Tuesday proposed linking fuel supply with a valid vehicle insurance as part of a pilot project to stop uninsured vehicles from plying.

"It is shocking to learn that nearly 56 per cent of vehicles (16.54 crore of 30.48 crore vehicles) plying on Indian roads remain uninsured... The consequent effect is that the statutory safeguard of victim compensation is often delayed, if not defeated," a Bench of Justice Sanjay Karol and Justice Prashant Kumar Mishra said.

The number of road accidents stood at 4,87,705 in 2024; 4,80,583 in 2023; and 4,61,312 in 2022, it said, pointing out the magnitude of the problem.

The Bench flagged the lack of compliance of provisions of the Motor Vehicles Act, requiring all vehicles to have a valid insurance policy covering third parties.

The top court directed the Centre to evolve a pilot project by which fuel can be refused at petrol stations to vehicles not having a valid insurance cover. It directed the Centre to implement a pilot project on certain corridors, substituting the process of stopping at toll plazas, with automatic detection of vehicles passing through toll points.

The Bench also "directed that henceforth, third-party insurance for four years for new cars and six years for new two-wheelers will be required. It asked the Insurance Regulatory and Development Authority (IRDA) to immediately issue the necessary directions in this regard.

The top court issued these directions while upholding the Telangana High Court's direction to Na-



tional Insurance Company to compensate the family of a man who died in a road accident while travelling in an insured vehicle.

Noting that the top court had issued directions mandating the purchase of a third-party insurance for three years for new cars and five years for two-wheelers at the time of purchase/registration of new vehicles in S Rajaseekaran vs Union of India (2018) case, it noted that despite eight years having passed since the said direction, a large number of vehicles remained uninsured.

"While the IRDA and GIC (General Insurance Company) have recommended that this period not be enhanced, we are of the view that it is in the interest of road safety that the period be enhanced by one year," it said.

The Bench directed the insurance companies to display in easy-to-read format on their websites the benefits of obtaining a comprehensive motor vehicle insurance cover.

Shift to T-Fiber by Sept 1: Telangana IT Min to all govt offices

Telangana IT and Industries Minister D Sridhar Babu on Tuesday directed officials to ensure that all government offices in the state receive internet services exclusively through T-Fiber from September 1.

Reviewing the progress of T-Fiber, the minister instructed officials to provide internet connectivity to all government offices within the stipulated deadline, according to a press release.

He directed that no payments be made to private internet service providers for government offices after September 1.

Sridhar Babu instructed officials to complete the migration of the Telangana State Wide Area Network to T-Fiber within a month.

The minister directed officials to make comprehensive arrangements to provide full-fledged T-Fiber connectivity for the prestigious Future City project.

He instructed officials to expedite the implementation of the state's flagship "Internet to Every Home"



initiative.

The meeting was attended by Chief Secretary Sanjay Jaju, Joint Secretary, Ministry of Electronics and IT, Anudeep Durishetty, and T-Fiber Managing Director Venu Prasad, the release added.

He said that the Warangal Regional Cancer Hospital will be developed to provide state-of-the-art cancer services to the people of North Telangana.



13,046 farm ponds in Telangana to be completed by August 15

Hyderabad: Telangana Special Chief Secretary for Rural Development and Panchayat Raj Department, M Dana Kishore, on Tuesday, August 4, instructed district officials to complete the construction of 13,046 farm ponds by August 15.

Conducting a video conference, Dana Kishore instructed officials to ensure 100 per cent identification, administrative sanction and grounding of farm ponds in every gram panchayat.

He directed each district to take up at least 50 eco farm ponds through convergence with the Society for Elimination of Rural Poverty – National Rural Livelihoods Mission (SERP-NRLM) and animal husbandry, horticulture and fisheries departments.

Officials were asked to accord top priority to water conservation works under Telangana Jalasiri, including farm ponds, soak pits, percolation tanks, borewell recharge structures and open wells.

District officials were asked to undertake daily field inspections, hold regular review meetings with mandal-level officers and closely monitor progress to ensure that the targets are achieved within the stipulated timeline.

He also asked officials to complete the preparation of Gram Panchayat Samagra Abhivruddhi Pranalika (GPSAP) plans and compile comprehensive panchayat-wise data for a three-year development plan.

Bengaluru civic body officials assaulted during anti-encroachment drive, 10 held

The police arrested 10 people, including street vendors, Tuesday for assaulting officers of the Greater Bengaluru Authority (GBA) during a footpath encroachment clearance drive near the Shivajinagar Bus Stand, Police Commissioner Seemanth Kumar said.The police said the assault was allegedly led by Basavaraj Padukote, who heads Namma Karnataka Sene, a pro-Kannada organisation. Investigators alleged that a group led by him attacked GBA officials during the anti-encroachment drive.Kumar said GBA officials, including Assistant Executive Engineer Madhav Rao, were obstructed and man-handled by a group while they were carrying out the demolition and footpath clearance operation that was in compliance with a court order.“The assault was captured on video, which has become a key piece of evidence in the investigation. Our officers rushed to the spot immediately after the incident. We will arrest everyone found to have participated in the assault,” Kumar told reporters.The drive was part of the ongoing Safe Footpath Campaign aimed at reclaiming pedestrian spaces occupied by unauthorised vendors, and clearing temporary structures and commercial encroachments across Bengaluru city.Reacting to the incident, Karnataka Revenue Minis-

ter Krishna Byre Gowda said the government stood firmly with the officials discharging their duties and warned that attacks on public servants would not be tolerated and directed the police commissioner and GBA officials to take stringent action against those responsible.“All those who assaulted government representatives during the Safe Footpath Campaign will be arrested. Assaulting public servants while they implement the directions of the Hon’ble Supreme Court is a serious violation of the law,” the minister said.The minister said he was personally monitoring the investigation’s progress with GBA officials and the Bengaluru police.A case was registered at the Commercial Street Police Station, following which the police arrested five accused. “Our officers are also gathering information about the accused’s background,” the police commissioner added.

The police said further investigation is underway to identify additional suspects and ascertain the circumstances leading to the assault.In recent weeks, GBA teams have intensified enforcement in several commercial localities, including Shivajinagar, Commercial Street, Gandhi Bazaar and other busy markets where pedestrian movement is frequently obstructed.

‘Government should respond to these terrorists’: Sadabhau Khot on Delhi protesters

A day after the protest led by the Cockroach Janta Party (CJP) in Delhi over alleged NEET paper leaks, Maharashtra legislator Sadabhau Khot triggered a political controversy Tuesday by referring to the demonstrators as “terrorists”, drawing sharp criticism from Opposition leaders and even a member of the Maharashtra Government.The remark by Khot, a member of the Maharashtra Legislative Council (MLC), came after the Cockroach Janta Party’s Delhi protest escalated Monday as thousands of students and supporters marched towards Parliament, demanding action over alleged NEET paper leaks and examination irregularities.“The government should give a democratic response to these terrorists. These terrorists cannot tolerate this,” Khot told reporters, defending the Centre’s handling of the examination controversy.Calling the NEET paper leak a conspiracy, Khot said the culprits had been arrested and investigations were underway as he questioned the demand for Union Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan’s resignation.“The government has taken the stance that the guilty will not be spared. Those who qualified in NEET are rushing for admissions, but those who have no connection to it are demanding resignations,” Khot said.

“Dharmendra Pradhan has no connection to the paper leak issue. However, the INDIA bloc and MVA are in the habit of creating anti-government sentiment and continuously spreading falsehoods. The INDIA bloc and MVA

are trying to create a situation akin to terrorism,” he added.“The government should not accept the Education Minister’s resignation under any circumstances. Narendra at the Centre, Devendra in the state, and Dharmendra in education,” he said, referring to Prime Minister Modi, Maharashtra Chief Minister Fadnavis, and Pradhan.While Fadnavis said he was not aware of Khot’s statement, his Cabinet colleague, Shambhuraj Desai, who belongs to the Shiv Sena, said protesters cannot be called terrorists.“In a democracy, everyone has the right to protest. However, smashing and destroying police vehicles, taking the law into one’s own hands, is not right.

At the same time, protesters cannot be called terrorists,” Desai said.NCP-SP spokesperson Sunil Mane said Khot’s statement was “highly deplorable”. “He should have thought several times before calling protesting students terrorists. We condemn his words.”Maharashtra Congress spokesperson Gopal Tiwari called Khot’s statement “shocking”.“How can one call a protest by students in a democratic way an act of terrorism? Actually, Khot reflects the mindset of Modi, which treats citizens who resort to democratic ways as terrorists, and it backs those who loot the country.”

Another farmer leader, MLA Bacchu Kadu, urged Khot to retract his statement. “Sadabhau Khot’s statement is completely wrong. He needs to correct his statement. Protests have been the soul of this country; our nation gained its freedom through movements,” Kadu added.

‘People will think twice about sailor jobs’: UP village mourns man killed in Russian strike

Abhishek Nishad, 22, a native of Uttar Pradesh’s Deoria district, was among four Indian seafarers killed on Sunday when a Russian missile struck a merchant vessel shortly after it departed Ukraine’s southern port of Odesa. A total of 10 people died in the attack.The voyage was Nishad’s first assignment at sea. His family had celebrated his departure, seeing it as the beginning of a promising career abroad.“Abhishek became interested in a maritime career after speaking with his cousin, Jairaj Nishad, a sailor for the past few years,” said his father, Kaushal Nishad, who runs a small cloth shop in Karmel village.“After completing his intermediate studies two years ago, Abhishek began preparing to join the merchant navy and gathered information online.”

“On June 9, Abhishek left for his first assignment as an Ordinary Seaman. He flew to Turkey via Mumbai to join the vessel,” Kaushal added. “Everyone in our family and neighbourhood was proud that one of our boys had secured a job overseas. We never imagined it would end in such a tragedy.”The second of three children born to Kaushal Nishad and his wife Anita Devi, a homemaker, Abhishek was the first member of his family to secure employment abroad. His younger sisters, Sadhna and Aradhna, are pursuing postgraduate and undergraduate degrees, respectively. Abhishek was unmarried.’Spoke just a few hours before the attack’“He called us regularly, and we last spoke on the evening of July 19. He asked how everyone was doing and said he was settling into his new job,” his father recalled. “Just a few hours later, the ship came under a missile attack.”

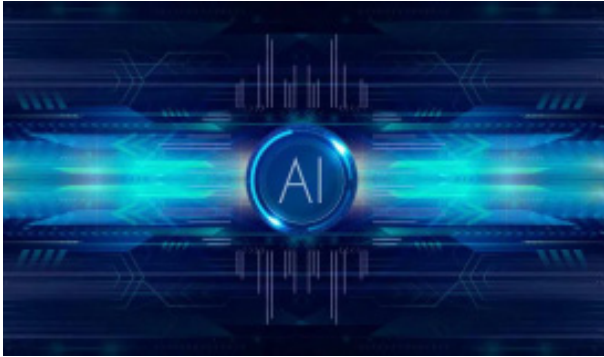
Lohagad wasn’t first choice: Pune Rural police reveal fresh details in Ketan murder probe



The Pune Rural police investigating the murder of Ketan Agarwal last month said his fiancée, Siya Goyal, and her boyfriend, Chetan Chaudhary, explored other locations, including Tiger Point in Lonavala and some other forts, before finalising the spot at Lohagad Fort.The police also said the two researched other ways, including poisoning, to kill Ketan and also studied ways to protect themselves from getting caught. They added that the two watched some murder conspiracy movies for this purpose.“Our investigation suggests that before finalising Lohagad fort as the location where they would execute their plan, Chetan and Siya explored other similar locations in the area, including Tiger Point at Lonavala and

other forts near Lonavala, including Visapur, which is next to Lohagad,” an officer who is part of the probe said.“After they decided on Lohagad, they shared some photos of the fort with each other. They had finalised Lohagad fort sometime before May 31,” the officer added.The police, however, refused to divulge how they explored other options and finalised Lohagad.Amidst reports that Chetan and Siya contacted a contract killer, the police said the two discussed the option of arranging a hit to injure Ketan but did not approach anyone.Investigators claim the alleged murder was the culmination of weeks of planning by Siya and Chetan. According to the Pune Rural Police, Siya allegedly made multiple trips to Lohagad Fort with Ketan before the incident, including on May 31 and June 14, to familiarise herself with the location.They also said she tried to persuade him to visit the fort on June 4, but the trip did not materialise after his family objected.The police have further alleged that Siya and Chetan rehearsed the crime days before Ketan’s death in an open space near a club lounge in Pune’s Lulla Nagar area. Investigators also claim Siya had earlier tried to derail her planned marriage to Ketan by stealing his passport ahead of their proposed pre-wedding shoot in Bali and later discarding it in a washroom at a food mall on the Pune-Mumbai Expressway.Siya and Ketan got engaged on February 19 and were scheduled to marry later this year.

AI helps ECI detect duplicate voters during electoral roll revision in Telangana



Hyderabad: Technology is playing a crucial role in the ongoing Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral roll in the State, flagging duplicate and triplicate votes across the constituencies in the State.After implementing photo similar entries (PSE) and demographic similar entries (DSE) during SIR exercise in West Bengal, the Election Commission of India (ECI) rolled out the same features in ongoing SIR exercise in the State.Using Artificial Intelligence, the PSE, which is embedded in the Electoral Roll Management system, is flagging voters who have identical or closely matching photographs for the BLOs and EROs to verify the electors.

In addition, the DSE search has been deployed to scan through the voters’ details such as the elector’s name, father’s name, mother’s name, spouse’s name, age and

date of birth, and address.The application is flagging issues if same or similar demographic entries appear in two or more electoral lists. This is enabling the authorities to verify the details with electors.Speaking to ‘Telangana Today’, one of the BLOs in the Kukatapally constituency said he found three votes of a person with the same name but with different spellings.“I came across one voter, Shankar, whose name has different spellings in different polling booths. However, father’s name remained the same in all three votes. The application flagged it as a triplicate vote, and I have to call up the voter to ascertain which one vote has to be retained,” the BLO said.

Another BLO revealed that after he filled up details of a voter in the ERONET, the application flagged double votes, with one in Khairtabad constituency and another in Amberpet constituency.“Using the PSE and DSE, the application is mapping voter details in the given database and flagging the double or multiple votes of a person. Since it’s a double vote, there is a need to verify with the voter before marking it as a double vote for removal,” the BLO said.Not just intra-State, the application has been flagging individuals with multiple votes across the different States, aiding officers to issue notices for removal of votes.According to the ECI, a staggering 6.44 crore votes had been removed from the final electoral roll of West Bengal after SIR 2025 and 2026. This could be made possible using the PSE and DSE applications in the ERONET.

Sri Sri Ravi Shankar ashram ‘encroached’ on land beyond lease limits; SIT to probe

The Karnataka government has formed a Special Investigation Team (SIT) to inquire into the alleged land encroachment by Sri Sri Ravi Shankar’s ashram and allied groups, based on an October 2025 survey that flagged encroachment of 291 acres of land reserved for animal grazing and public needs.A government order issued on Tuesday stated that the Art of Living Foundation “encroached land beyond the limits of the land leased to it by the government”. The alleged encroachments took place in survey numbers 160, 164/1, 164/2, 150, and 137 of Kaggalipura village, Bengaluru South taluk, which has government land, lakes, and stormwater drains.In 2023, three people—Chandrashekar N, Mahesha B, and Muniraju S—moved the Karnataka High Court alleging that the foundation had constructed buildings over a stormwater drain. They also flagged a lake’s encroachment. The court issued directions in 2025 for the revenue department to clear the encroachment, according to the order.The order further said that a few locals and agents of the foundation had obstructed repeated attempts to conduct a survey as per the law, noting that the majority of the lake in survey no 150 was encroached on.As per the order, the foundation has built a compound wall on land of 291 acres and 38 guntas, including 60 acres leased to it. The lease period for 41 acres expired in 2015, while the lease period for the rest of the 60 acres will expire in



2033.When contacted, Chandrashekar said, “We had compiled documents regarding encroachment of the lake and stormwater drain before approaching the court.”Among the related organisations accused of encroachment along with the foundation are Veda Vijnana Maha Vidayapeeta Institute, Sumeru Global Support Solutions Private Limited, and Sumeru Realty Private Limited.The SIT will investigate the violations, how the lands were encroached upon, the conditions allegedly violated by the foundation, and other land-related complaints against it. The SIT will verify land grant documents and also identify public roads, water sources, and other common land that the foundation is accused of encroaching on.

The theatre of hope: Md Zeeshan Ayyub returns to stage with Jhilmilganj Ke Sitare

As actors Md Zeeshan Ayyub and Gagan Dev Riar rehearse Jhilmilganj Ke Sitare, they suddenly break into a rhythmic chant, “Khus phus khus phus khus, phus khus phus khus phus”, while seamlessly transforming a scene. Their playfulness underscores a darker moment in the story: the town’s powerful plot to build a dam that goes against the interest of Jhilmilganj’s residents.For Ayyub, the production marks a long-awaited return to the stage after nearly eight years. Directed by actor-director Rasika Agashe, the Hindi adaptation of James Hindman’s Popcorn Falls pairs him with Riar in a demanding two-hander that celebrates the resilience of theatre itself.When Ayyub told Agashe, his wife, that he wanted to return to acting on stage, she reached out to Riar, who suggested several two-hander plays before they settled on Popcorn Falls.“A certain monotonous sets in after doing on-camera work for several years. I had been yearning to act in a play. Everything aligned this time — from acting with Gagan, whose work I have long admired, to connecting with the play itself,” says Ayyub.

While preserving the spirit of the original, the team has thoroughly Indianised the setting. American references have been replaced with local ones — the mayor becomes a block development officer (BDO), cultural references have been reworked, and songs have been woven into the narrative.The story follows BDO Tousef, who discovers that Jhilmilganj is set to disappear under a proposed dam project. Along with his secretary Jogji, he embarks on a frantic mission to save the town, meeting an array of eccentric residents along the way. Their unlikely solution is to stage a play that can rally the community.“The play’s core message is that art can save the world. But it is never preachy,” says Agashe.

The production’s greatest challenge lies in its form. Between them, Ayyub and Riar play around 20 characters, with Riar portraying nearly 15 roles and Ayyub donning five. The performance depends on split-second costume changes, rapid vocal shifts and sharply defined physical transformations.Ayyub last appeared on stage



with Agashe in Iss Kambakht Sathe Ka Kya Karein?, which they performed between 2008 and 2018. Since then, he has become known for films such as Raanjhanaa, Raees and Tanu Weds Manu Returns.For Riar, whose theatre credits include Stories in a Song and Piya Behrupiya, and who has appeared in A Suitable Boy and Scam 2003: The Telgi Story, the play has been unlike anything he has attempted before.“It’s a difficult play to shape. After every few scenes, we’d ask ourselves, ‘How do we take this forward?’ It was physically exhausting because of the number of characters. But that’s also what makes it exciting,” he says.Ayyub agrees that the mechanics of the play demand unwavering focus.“With so many quick transitions, we have to stay alert all the time. Sometimes a character has just one line, but even that requires a completely different approach. Every entry has to feel distinct.”The production also prompted him to revisit skills he had not practised in years.“I learnt stage singing at NSD, but I hadn’t done voice exercises in a long time. This play pushed me to reconnect with that training.”Beyond the technical rigour, both actors say the experience reaffirmed what makes theatre irreplaceable.“That connection with your fellow actors and with a live audience is unlike anything else,” says Riar.For Ayyub, the return is less about nostalgia than rediscovering the exhilaration of live performance.

INDIA bloc MPs seek answers over alleged force on NEET protesters

New Delhi: The Congress party and its allies in the INDIA bloc on Thursday staged a protest at Makar Dwar of the Parliament, demanding answers from the NDA government over the alleged use of lethal force against student protesters during the July 20 ‘Sansad Chalo’ march against NEET paper leaks.

Holding banners carrying the message ‘Who gave the orders?’, INDIA bloc MPs gathered at the Parliament premises and sought accountability over the police action against students who had participated in the demonstration against NEET-related irregularities and paper leaks.The protest came a day after Lok Sabha Leader of

Opposition, Rahul Gandhi, raised serious questions over the alleged use of force against the students and sought answers from Union Home Minister Amit Shah on who had ordered the reported “firing” during the NEET protests.

The BJP and its allies strongly objected to LoP Gandhi’s remarks, particularly his allegation that the Union Home Minister had directed action against the protesting students, and questioned the basis of his claims.Speaking to IANS, BJP MP Praveen Khandelwal, reacting to the allegations, said, “Whatever Rahul Gandhi says, people no longer take his statements seriously because he only knows how to make allegations.

Profits remain elusive for India's e-commerce sector

India's e-commerce industry presents a paradox: On the one hand, it is one of the world's fastest-growing markets, while on the other, it remains unprofitable despite years of rapid expansion. While the sector is not short of growth, capital or ambition, what it has struggled to build, cycle after cycle, is a business model in which growth and profit move in the same direction at the same time. The tough and increasingly transactional global trade environment, coupled with a still-unresolved domestic cash-burn habit, is forcing the industry's hand. The platforms most likely to emerge as durable winners will probably not be the ones that deliver the fastest or offer the deepest discount, but the ones that quietly figure out how to make each order, each return, and each customer relationship pay for itself. The latest 'India E-Commerce Report 2026' by Delhi-based policy think tank, Centre for Social and Economic Progress (CSEP), argues that policy around India's online retail sector has focused excessively on tackling market concentration—a few dominant players controlling too much of the market—while overlooking the structural reasons why most e-commerce firms remain unprofitable despite years of rapid expansion. India's merchandise e-commerce market expanded from about \$14 billion in 2014 to \$120-130 billion in 2024, and is expected to reach \$300-350 billion by 2030, growing at an annual rate of 20-25%. However, despite exponential growth in the sector, profitability remains elusive. The challenge is less about market concentration and more about cost economics. In many ways, the country's e-commerce industry is at an inflection point.

The era of rapid expansion fuelled by abundant capital, discounts, and customer acquisition is giving way to a phase where profitability, efficiency, and innovation will determine success. While the long-term fundamentals remain robust—supported by digital payments, rising internet penetration, and a vast consumer base—the winners are likely to be companies that excel in AI-driven operations, logistics, export capabilities, and sustainable unit economics, rather than those that rely solely on aggressive growth strategies.

At present, the average revenue per user is only \$107, far below \$1,330 in China, \$514 in Mexico, and \$350 in Brazil. Indian consumers also spend less per order, particularly in Tier-2 and Tier-3 cities where average order values range from Rs 500 to Rs 700, compared with around Rs 900 or more in Tier-1 cities. Moreover, nearly half of all online orders in India are still paid through cash on delivery, which increases costs for e-commerce firms. Logistics and warehousing remain the biggest expenses for e-commerce companies, with last-mile delivery accounting for around 60% of delivery costs. Data collection, strengthening export logistics for cross-border e-commerce, expanding digital commerce into rural markets, supporting MSMEs through digital platforms, and addressing the welfare of gig workers are other areas that need attention. Going forward, policymakers should avoid excessive intervention that could discourage investment while simultaneously strengthening enforcement against anti-competitive practices.

He is wanted in four murder cases registered in Punjab, the police said. The capture of Billa marks the culmination of Operation Nomad Hunt—an intelligence-driven manhunt involving sustained global surveillance and coordination by multiple agencies.

The Anti-Gangster Task Force (AGTF) and the Overseas Fugitive Tracking and Extradition Cell (OFTEC) — specialised agencies of the Punjab Police — have played a crucial role in Billa's extradition.OFTEC Punjab was established in January to systematically address the challenges posed by foreign-based gangsters, terrorists, and other absconders who remotely control organised crime, extortion, targeted killings, drug trafficking, arms smuggling, and related activities within Punjab.OFTEC's key role is to streamline international police cooperation and close procedural gaps that had caused delays when cases were handled at the district or police-station level. Its key functions include identifying and monitoring absconding criminals, especially gangsters, operating from abroad, notably the US, UAE, Canada, UK, Germany, and other locations.It also prepares and processes Interpol notices like Red Corner Notices, Blue Corner Notices, etc, extradition requests, Mutual Legal Assistance Requests (MLARs), and Letters Rogatory (LRs).

After deadly blaze, Lucknow building being partially razed over violations



About a month after a fire tore through a two-storey building in Lucknow, killing 15 people, the Lucknow Development Authority (LDA) on Saturday began demolishing portions of the structure after determining that it allegedly violated the approved building plan. The action came after the owner of the building, located in the city's Aliganj neighbourhood, failed to remove the unauthorised construction within a 15-day deadline.

LDA officers, accompanied by district administration personnel and police, arrived at the site in the morning and started the process to raze the sections identified as being built in violation of the sanctioned plan. The razing

work may take two to three days to complete, said an officer."The owner had begun demolishing the building himself after being served a notice. He was given 15 days to complete the work, but the deadline expired today; so the LDA has stepped in to carry out the demolition," said Dhruv Kumar, station house officer of Aliganj police station.Preliminary findings indicated that the building had been sanctioned for residential use but was allegedly being used for commercial activities, officials said.Kumar said heavy earth-moving equipment was deployed for the operation as authorities closed the adjoining road and suspended electricity supply in the area for a safe demolition.Following the fatal fire on June 22, the LDA had issued notices to the building's owners after an initial inspection found alleged violations of the sanctioned building plan.The building housed a pet clinic and pet shop on two floors, while another floor was occupied by a company involved in art production and game development.According to police, records show that the land on which the building stands is jointly owned by Virendra Prasad Shukla and his brother, Surendra Shukla.The police registered a case against several individuals for culpable homicide and endangering life or personal safety.So far, police have arrested four people, including the building owner, in connection with the case. The other three were those who had the spaces on rent.

Protesters clash with police in Bihar amid call for statewide bandh, Tej Pratap detained in Patna

Protesters clashed with police in several districts of Bihar, including capital Patna and Chapra, as the protests against the NEET paper leak expanded to a nationwide protest.Clashes also broke out between the police personnel and protesters in at least three districts: Patna, Aurangabad, and Chapra.Janshakthi Janta Dal (JJD) chief Tej Pratap Yadav was detained in Patna after he joined the protesters who had gathered in support of the statewide bandh over NEET paper leak, and police action on protesting students over the past few days, PTI reported.Yadav joined protesters during a sit-in protest at Ram Gulam Chowk in Patna, from where he was taken away in a police vehicle. Clinging to the vehicle door, Yadav said, "We are standing shoulder to shoulder with the students. If need be, I am willing to die for the students' rights."Left-wing protesters carrying banners of All India Students Association (AISA) and Revolutionary Youth Association (RYA) blocked the Samastipur-Patna main road by burning tyres and raising slogans against the government, PTI reported.Visuals shared by news agency ANI showed damaged police vehicles. They also showed miscreants attacking cars, stone-pelting civilians, and lathicharging police personnel in Chapra, Patna, and Aurangabad.In Bihar's Siwan district, AISA, RYA and other left-wing organisations also staged protests at JP Chowk against police action on students on July 22, it added.Visuals of police vehicles being vandalised and toppled in Patna circulated over social media, according to ANI. The police personnel also used tear gas shells to disperse the protesters.Former MLA and CPI(ML) leader Amarjeet Kushwaha, present during the protest, told PTI, "Protest has been underway at Delhi's Jantar Mantar for the last 26 days. Students also came out on the streets of Patna on Wednesday. However, both in Delhi and in Patna, they faced brutal police action. Even women and girls were not spared."He alleged that the government has adopted a dictatorial approach towards handling protests, according to the report.



Meanwhile, speaking to the reporters today, Deputy Superintendent of Police, Patna, Raj Kishore, said, "People have come from outside as well, and we have caught those who pelted stones..."Protesters also pelted stones and bricks at police personnel at Dak Bungalow Chouraha in Patna, following which police detained several students, according to PTI reports."Protesters pelted stones at us. They even tried to break the barricading. We have detained several students. Police is on high alert. We will trace the troublemakers and take appropriate action against them," Patna SSP Kartikeya K Sharma told reporters.Security has been tightened with heavy police deployment in Patna, Siwan, Jehanabad, Sheikhpura, Rohtas and other districts across the state, the PTI report stated.Although there wasn't much impact of the bandh on normal life in Patna, police did initiate flag marches in several areas, including Patna's Paliganj locality, as a precautionary measure, the report noted.On Wednesday, violent clashes broke out at JP Golambar in Patna as police used water cannons, tear gas shells and resorted to lathi charge to stop the protesters marching towards Raj Bhavan under the banner of the AISA. The demonstration was organised in solidarity with the ongoing student agitation at Delhi's Jantar Mantar and to protest the recent police action against protesters there, according to a report in The Indian Express.

Punjab invokes 1911 law to keep garbage moving during strike

All Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) in Punjab have been directed to ensure that "under no circumstances" is there any disruption in the collection, lifting, transportation and disposal of municipal solid waste during the ongoing strike by sanitation workers, the state government informed the Punjab and Haryana High Court on Friday.

Noting the state's assurance that these directions will remain in force till the issue of strike is resolved, a bench of Justice Pankaj Jain adjourned the matter to August 11.The HC has been hearing a writ petition filed by Sangrur residents Pardeep Kumar and others. Justice Jain took on record an affidavit filed by secretary (local government) Ghanshyam Thori, pursuant to the court's July 20 order directing Punjab to place on record the steps taken to tackle the sanitation crisis across municipal bodies.Along with the affidavit, the State placed before the court an internal communication issued by the Department of Local Government to Deputy Commissioners, Commissioners of Municipal Corporations and Executive Officers of Urban Local Bodies across Punjab. The communication stated that "...all Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) are directed to ensure appropriate contingency measures...that, under no circumstances, there is any disruption in the collection, lifting, transportation, and disposal of municipal solid waste".The communication further directs to ensure that adequate door-to-door collection of municipal solid waste is carried out from all designated collection points and all collected garbage is transported and disposed of only at the designated waste disposal/dump sites."After the lifting of garbage, proper sanitization and disinfection of the affected areas are carried out...Sensitive locations where garbage accumulation is generally high are monitored regularly to prevent excessive accumulation of waste," it reads, adding that "all necessary measures are taken to ensure efficient collection, transportation, and scientific disposal of municipal solid waste in accordance with the applicable rules and guidelines".The communication further provides that "all



the Deputy Commissioners are directed to immediately invoke Section 233 and 234 of the Punjab Municipal Act, 1911 and ensure that all the Municipal Councils, Nagar Panchayats in the State of Punjab have alternate contingency measures to ensure that work of municipal waste is not disrupted."

With regard to Municipal Corporations, it states that "the Government, while exercising the power under Section 405 of the Punjab Municipal Corporation Act, 1976, issues directions to all the Commissioners to take similar action as described action."The court, during the hearing, also recorded the submission of senior counsel Anu Chatrath, appearing for the respondent municipal council, that "the directives issued by the Secretary, Department of Local Bodies, Punjab (supra) shall remain in vogue till the issue of strike is resolved."On July 20, while hearing the same petition, the court had expressed concern over the sanitation crisis arising out of the strike by sanitation workers across Punjab.

The court had held that the monsoon has already set in, it apprehended that the prevailing situation may lead to a risk of an epidemic. The court had thus directed the Punjab government to file an affidavit detailing the action taken in all municipal councils to tide over the situation and warned that if the affidavit was not filed before the next date of hearing, the Secretary, Local Bodies, would have to remain present in person.The petition, filed by Sangrur residents, alleges that repeated failures to ensure uninterrupted sanitation services have resulted in garbage accumulation and pose a serious threat to public health.The petitioners have sought directions to the Punjab government and municipal authorities to ensure continuous sanitation services and put in place effective contingency arrangements during the ongoing strike by sanitation workers.

'Sebaashray camp is a scam': Bengal CM targets Abhishek Banerjee, warns of strict action



Bengal Chief Minister Suvendu Adhikari Saturday took a dig at Abhishek Banerjee over his Sebaashray health camps and warned that the government will take appropriate action at the right time.Making a statement in the Assembly, Adhikari said several FIRs have been registered against Banerjee over alleged large-scale corruption involving the Sebaashray project, and assured that all allegations will be investigated by the Criminal Investigation Department and a Special Task Force.The chief minister said in the Assembly, "The nephew's (referring to Abhishek Banerjee) Sebaashray camp is a scam." He then showed several photographs of people who allegedly lost their limbs after getting treated at Sebaashray camps.Subsequently, CM Adhikari informed the Assembly of the measures the state government has taken about Sebaashray.He said, "We have taken action. We have written to the Atomic Energy Department of the Central Government and the Health Department. We have seized X-ray machines and USG machines. We have seized expired medicines. We have acted against the government funds spent on the project in Diamond Harbour and Nandigram, and against the government doctors who were assigned duty there. A thorough investigation is being conducted involving the CID, STF, and the district police. Every complaint from those who were harmed at the Sebashray camp has been taken as an FIR. Rest assured, those who have committed such a grave crime will not be spared. Time will tell. All evidence is being collected."Banerjee was recently booked after a woman complained that she lost a leg following treatment for knee pain at a Sebaashray camp, a healthcare outreach initiative launched by the Diamond Harbour MP in West Bengal a few months ago.Banerjee launched the Sebaashray health camps in 2025 across his Lok Sabha constituency, among other places.The TMC leader also faces allegations relating to alleged misappropriation of Cyclone Amphan relief funds, illegal soil extraction and irregularities in government housing schemes. He has been named in multiple cases, including one involving the alleged forgery of signatures on a Trinamool document and another over his remarks on the use of DJs during an election rally.

Over 2,300 measles cases recorded in US, worst outbreak in 35 years | What's happening



As many as 2,318 confirmed cases of the contagious illness have been recorded since the beginning of 2026, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. This figure surpasses the 2025 total of 2,289 cases and three deaths, including two young children. The last time the US experienced such a high number of measles cases was in 1991, when 9,643 cases were recorded. According to the World Health Organisation (WHO), the symptoms of measles, which is a highly contagious disease caused by a virus, include a cough, runny nose, high fever, and rash all over the body. It also infects the respiratory tract. It can cause severe complications and can even lead to death. Although the disease can infect anyone, it is most common in children. Measles was declared eradicated in the US in 2000 because of vacci-

nation. However, before the development of the measles vaccine in the early 1960s, the contagious disease killed hundreds of children annually in the US, and it reportedly continues to claim lives worldwide, according to a report by news agency AFP.

The virus has made a comeback in recent years, which has been linked by medical experts to declining immunization rates. A trend many attribute in part to vaccine skepticism espoused by President Donald Trump's health secretary, Robert F. Kennedy Jr, reported Reuters. Andrew Racine, president of the American Academy of Pediatrics, said, "Since early last year, federal leaders have dismissed measles as benign and unavoidable and have spread misleading information about the MMR vaccine," reported Reuters. Melissa Nolan, a professor of epidemiology at the University of South Carolina, said she believes that there is an "underdiagnosis." "When you think about the people who are choosing not to vaccinate their children, these are also the people that have medical hesitancy in general," she told AFP. Although the measles vaccine is mandatory in the US, people in much of the country can bypass the requirement by claiming religious or philosophical exemptions. Since the COVID-19 pandemic, these non-medical exemptions have surged alongside a rise in vaccine misinformation. A September 2025 poll by The Washington Post and the nonprofit KFF showed that one in six American parents avoid or delay vaccinating their children due to fears of side effects and a lack of trust in health authorities.

'Regime toppled, being run by gay dictator': Trump's indirect jibe at Mojtaba Khamenei



United States President Donald Trump called Iranian Supreme Leader Mojtaba Khamenei 'gay' during the White House Correspondents' Dinner on Friday, without taking his name directly. Talking about his administration's achievements which, as per him, are often overlooked by "fake news media", he spoke of the country's ongoing war with Iran and said, "A once feared and powerful regime that relentlessly attacked America has finally been toppled. Their former leaders have been removed and they're now being run by a gay dictator facing internal divisions." Trump made the remarks at the White House Correspondents' Association Dinner held at Waldorf Astoria in Washington DC on Friday.

During his hour-long address, which was full of jokes and potshots at journalists including praises for some, Trump touched on multiple aspects of his second presidential term including the country's ongoing war with Iran and also quipped about a possible third term in office, before saying that he was "just kidding". The dinner, which originally took place back in April, was rescheduled after a shooting incident at the security gate prompted an immediate evacuation of the venue. Trump began his address with a remark stating that it had "not been an easy evening for him" after multiple awards were handed out

to journalists over the course of the night, many of whom had been critical of his administration. Press Secretary has one of the hardest jobs in White House Drawing back to the original dinner which took place in April, the President remarked that he "suspected" many members of his audience were "lucky" that their last dinner was "cut short" due to the fierce criticism he had planned on delivering. He then went on to label the Press Secretary's role as "one of the hardest jobs in the White House". "She has to deal with all of you all of the time and you can be very difficult... this place is really the largest group of Trump Derangement Syndrome people ever put together at one time I suspect," he added. Besides singling out multiple people for personal attacks including journalists such as Don Lemon and Lawrence O'Donnell, politicians like Chris Christie and Adam Schiff, and celebrities including Bruce Springsteen and Jane Fonda, the President also hinted at running for a possible third term in office. "I won three times — now I'm going to do it again," he said while putting on a red cap with "Trump 2028" labelled on it. Constitutionally, the 22nd Amendment explicitly bans a person from being "elected to the office of the president more than twice". Meanwhile, the US-Iran conflict entered a fresh round of confrontation on Friday as multiple strikes were reported in parts of the Gulf region. Several explosions were heard near Erbil airport in Iraq's autonomous Kurdistan region, where US-led coalition troops and a major US consulate complex are located. In retaliation, the United States targeted a Revolutionary Guards base in the northern province of Gilan as per deputy governor Ali Bagheri. Iran's foreign minister Abbas Araghchi warned countries against supporting the US in its attacks, adding that the country "reserves its right to take all necessary measures within the framework of self-defence". The US House of Representatives also passed a resolution calling for the White House to halt military action against Iran without explicit authorisation. The move, however, remained largely on paper as the US military continued its attacks for the 13th consecutive night.

'Xi, Putin assured they won't arm Iran': Trump places trust on two 'major countries'

US President Donald Trump on Friday said he trusted Russia and China were not participating in support of Iran in the ongoing West Asia conflict and also warned that any involvement by the two countries would be "very bad" and against their interests. In a post on Truth Social, Trump said Chinese President Xi Jinping had assured him during their recent meeting in Beijing that China would neither give nor sell weapons to Iran, including through Chinese companies.

"President Xi, at our recent meeting in Beijing, China, told me that he would not, under any circumstances, give or sell Weapons to the Islamic Republic of Iran — And that statement included Chinese Companies," Trump wrote, adding that he trusted Xi's assurance. Trump also said Russian President Vladimir Putin had told him Russia would not sell weapons to Tehran. "President Putin... told me that he would not sell Weapons to Iran. He understands that I do not sell Weapons to Ukraine, but to NATO Countries," Trump said, adding that both Russia and China were "not participating" in support of Iran. "Therefore, two major Countries that people speak of often in terms of Iran are, in my opinion, not participating. If they did, it would be very bad for them — Certainly not in their best interests," he added. Speaking to reporters later at the

White House, Trump said he trusted both leaders. "I don't know that they're enabling (Iran)," Trump said. "I think I trust them", according to a Reuters report. Trump's remarks came despite comments earlier this week by US Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth, who told lawmakers that Russia and China were helping Iran in ways he did not specify. "There are ways in which both of those countries are, at different levels, enabling some of the things Iran is doing, yes," Hegseth said during a Senate hearing.

Iranian strikes on CIA targets in the Gulf earlier in the conflict prompted US intelligence agencies to investigate whether Russia had provided Iran with targeting information or drone technology, according to a Reuters report. The Kremlin declined to comment on the report on Thursday, the report added. The United States has also imposed sanctions on individuals and companies in Russia and China accused of helping Iran procure weapons. The Hill noted that CNN reported in March, citing unnamed US officials, that Russia had been providing Iran with Russian satellite imagery to track the location and movement of American troops. Additionally, it also said NBC News reported in May, that Iran may have used Chinese missiles and long-range early-warning radar during the war.

NEW DELHI, When Indian television reporter Dev Kotak went to cover a massive youth protest against Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government this week, he planned to deliver a live broadcast, mill around ?and leave. Instead, amid chants of "godì (lapdog) media", he was beaten by dozens of protesters, because his channel is seen as pro-government. Mobile phone cameras captured the assault and ?the clip later went viral on social media. The Reuters Inside Track newsletter is your essential guide during the World Cup. Sign up here.

The physical attack on Kotak was unusual but through the protests, which gained momentum last week, people have heckled and abused crews from almost all of India's mainstream television channels, calling them pro-government and sold out. "The mob might have actually killed me. There was a seething anger among them because they felt the media hadn't reported their side of the story," said Kotak, 36, who covers general news ?for the Times Now channel. "There were slaps, kicks, punches and water bottles being thrown. I was very scared and feared for my life; I just wanted to get out ?alive." Anger has boiled over especially since a police crackdown on tens of thousands of protesters marching on parliament on Monday injured many students. "People kept ?shouting that we hadn't shown their side of the story," Kotak said. "That's simply not true — I've reported injuries on both sides." Times Now's editor-in-chief, Navika Kumar, did not respond to multiple requests ?for comment. The hostility towards reporters reflects a broader debate over

declining media freedom in the world's most populous democracy since Modi took office in 2014 and started dominating Indian politics.

India's ranking in the ?Reporters Without Borders' World Press Freedom Index has deteriorated sharply over the past decade. The country ranked 122nd in 2010 but fell to 157th out of 180 countries in 2026. The Paris-based media rights watchdog has attributed the decline to violence against journalists, concentration of media ownership in business that are aligned with the government and growing political polarisation. The Editors Guild of India condemned what it called ire "directed at representatives of the media outlets considered close to the government and the ruling party". But it also said: "Flawed and biased reporting not only makes a bad situation worse, but has more serious and longer-lasting consequences which impact the fabric of our society and also weaken the media's position as one of the key pillars of a functional democracy." The Information and Broadcasting Ministry and Modi's office did not immediately respond to requests for comment. A spokesperson ?for Modi's Bharatiya Janata Party declined comment. Prominent journalist Ravish Kumar, a winner of the Ramon Magsaysay Award, regarded as Asia's equivalent of the Nobel Prize, is credited with coining the term "godì media", which has spread widely because it also rhymes with Modi. The term has come to include almost all TV channels and some national newspapers for what critics say is their lack of scrutiny of government, coverage of Modi that borders on the fawning and ignoring or criticising any dissent.

"The godì-media is anti democracy, anti-people, anti-opposition," Kumar said. "They vilify any opposition, label critics as agents of foreign governments, and barely ever feature voices of political parties from opposition." A spokesperson for the protest movement, led by the Cockerpock Janta Party, said organisers had repeatedly urged demonstrators not to mistreat reporters. "We have urged and we keep urging protesters to not misbehave with godì-media," said Deepak Baliyan. "Let them do their job. We want to make sure that no one gets mistreated here." Manisha Pande, editorial ?director of news website NewsLaundry, said the distrust was the product of years of growing disillusionment with mainstream television news. "We have always had propaganda, partisanship, opinion-driven prime-time news," Pande said. "But what has really happened after 2014 is that you have seen a clear shift in how news has become anti-people." Digital commentator Akash Banerjee said the decline in trust of traditional news outlets had helped drive audiences toward independent online platforms. "The fact that the media has stopped questioning the government has resulted in a rise of alternative digital media, which would not have happened otherwise," said Banerjee, ried its own dangers.

Trump's tariffs likely to stick around despite unpopularity

President Donald Trump's latest tariffs are drawing anger from trading partners and voters, but the leverage and revenue they offer could make it hard for future presidents to fully give them up. Heading into the midterm elections, Trump's tariff agenda has been a major Democratic talking point as voters express anger over the cost of living. A longtime advocate for a more protectionist trade agenda, Trump argues that his policies have unleashed a US economic boom, and when they haven't, he says the duties are useful sticks in negotiations with trading partners. He continues to threaten more tariffs against allies like Canada, even though polling consistently shows that the tariffs are unpopular with voters, who are already frustrated with stubbornly high inflation.

But while criticism mounts globally and domestically, that doesn't mean a future president would fully roll back Trump's agenda, experts said, suggesting a Democrat could seek to make changes, to smooth relations with allies and ease the economic impact, without throwing them all out. For example, former President Joe Biden maintained — and in some cases expanded — the tariffs Trump implemented on China during his first term. "I do think in general tariffs are going to be more sticky than a lot of people believe," said Josh Lipsky, vice president and chair of international economics at the Atlantic Council, who noted that the tariffs are part of broader trade deals and provide revenue. "I think the pull of this will be hard to get away from." The latest tariff action, a 10% or 12.5% duty on imports from most trading partners, took effect Friday. They're based on allegations by the Trump administration that the targeted countries and economies failed to prevent forced labor in their supply chains, which several have said are baseless. Trading partners see it as unlikely that the forced-labor levies are rolled back any time soon, according to an official from a European Union member country. It's also doubtful whether there will be a return to the lower duty levels that preceded Trump, as the US disposition toward tariffs doesn't change much between administrations, said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The Tax Policy Center estimates that tariffs will raise about \$1.7 trillion in the next 10 years, with \$179 billion raised in 2026. The revenue will decline over time according to the TPC projection, as US buyers will gradually shift away from imports with high duties. Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent has called this the "melting ice cube" theory of tariffs. But tariffs are a Catch-22 when it comes to the deficit. The revenue they generated in 2025 and early 2026 did help to narrow the US budget gap before Trump's 'emergency' tariffs were invalidated by

the Supreme Court. But tariffs can also be a drag on economic growth, making it harder to reduce the deficit-to-GDP ratio. The latest effort is also not as lucrative as the sweeping tariffs that were struck down, and which the administration is currently in the process of refunding. A new analysis from the Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget says the current tariffs, including those announced this week, will replace less than 60% of the revenue lost by the ruling. Even when Trump acknowledges they don't work, he has offered tweaks to his tariffs rather than giving up on them wholesale. Despite tariffs, the "primary aluminum, which is critical to the US economy and defense industrial base, is still in insufficient supply," Trump said in a proclamation he signed on Monday. The policy change would halve duties on some aluminum imports in an effort to incentivize more smelting in the US. A YouGov survey of almost 9,700 US adults this week found 72% believed the president's levies increased the prices they paid for goods. Republicans are bracing for losses in the November midterm elections, given voter frustration over the economy and Trump's leadership. The GOP is defending their majorities in Congress, with the narrowly divided House of Representatives particularly vulnerable. The cost of living remains a key frustration for Americans. While data out earlier this month showed consumer prices fell amid lower gasoline prices in June, the cost of the fuel has headed back up since then and inflation remains elevated. That economic focus is likely to continue in the 2028 presidential primary. Given that, a future Democratic president will likely face pressure to make changes to the tariffs, said Matt Bennett, co-founder of the moderate Democratic think tank Third Way.

"Whoever will become president will have spent two years arguing that Trump has raised prices intentionally and that's going to be pretty hard to work back," he said, noting that there will be pressure to "lift a tariff and bring down prices." Trump is already facing legal pushback at home. Small businesses filed a pair of lawsuits in the US Court of International Trade on Friday, accusing the president and US officials of unlawfully using Section 301 of the Trade Act of 1974 to try to replace the earlier rounds of tariffs. Generally, Section 301 tariffs "are on stronger legal ground," despite legal challenge, trade historian and Dartmouth economics professor Douglas Irwin told Bloomberg TV. "It's not clear that the courts will overturn them, so these tariffs are probably here to stay for some time." Wendy Cutler, senior vice president at the Asia Society Policy Institute, said a new president who wanted to work with foreign allies may be "more sympathetic to try to find exit ramps with our allies and partners."

Killer of Air India bombing suspect gets 15-year jail term in separate murder case

Toronto, A contract killer, who is already serving a life term for the murder of a former suspect in the Air India Kanishka bombing, has been sentenced to an additional 15 years in prison by a Canadian court in a separate case involving a fatal shooting, according to a media report. Tanner Fox, 25, was sentenced on Wednesday after pleading guilty to the manslaughter of 41-year-old Chad Colivas of Abbotsford in British Columbia, the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation reported on Friday. Police said Colivas was found with gunshot wounds at his home on March 21, 2022, and later died of his injuries.

Fox was arrested in 2023 along with 30-year-old Laetitia Acera. Acera pleaded guilty to break and enter and was sentenced to four years in prison, followed by two years of probation, while Fox pleaded guilty to manslaughter with a firearm in April this year. Less than four months after Colivas' killing, Fox shot dead Sikh busi-

nessman Ripudaman Singh Malik on July 14, 2022, while he was sitting in his Tesla at a business park in Surrey, British Columbia. Malik was one of the main accused in the 1985 Air India Flight 182 "Kanishka" bombing executed by Canada-based Sikh separatists. All 329 people, including 268 Canadians, 27 British citizens, and 22 Indians on board the flight, were killed in the terror attack. Fox later pleaded guilty to the second-degree murder of Malik, who, along with co-accused

Ajaib Singh Bagri were acquitted in 2005 after a Canadian court ruled there was insufficient evidence to convict them in the terror attack. Inderjit Singh Reyat, who admitted to assembling the bombs, was the only person convicted in connection with the terror attack. He was later released in 2016 after serving nearly two-thirds of his sentence. In 2025, Fox was sentenced to life imprisonment without the possibility of parole for 20 years for Malik's killing. During sentencing, he told the court he had been "young and dumb" when he carried out the contract killing.

India squad for Sri Lanka Test series to be announced by Tuesday, confirms BCCI secretary Devajit Saikia



New Delhi: The Ajit Agarkar-led senior men’s selection committee will announce India’s Test squad for the upcoming tour of Sri Lanka by Tuesday, said BCCI secretary Devajit Saikia on Saturday.The Shubman Gill-led squad is scheduled to play two Test matches in Sri Lanka as part of their ICC World Test Championship (WTC) commitments. “By Tuesday, we’ll announce the Test team,” Saikia told IANS.

The opening Test match will be played at the picturesque Galle International Cricket Stadium (GICS) from August 15 to 19. The second and final Test will be played at the Sinhalese Sports Club (SSC) in Colombo from August 23 to 27.IANS had previously reported on July 20 that the Indian team will land in Colombo on August 4 and will play a four-day warm-up game from August 7 to 10 at the Nondescripts Cricket Club (NCC) in Colombo.While the majority of the squad will be the same, India’s main

concerns will be around the status of ace fast bowler Jasprit Bumrah and off-spin bowling all-rounder Washington Sundar. Bumrah missed the series-deciding third ODI against England at Lord’s after suffering an impact injury and reactive swelling on his left knee in the second game in Cardiff.

Washington, meanwhile, is recovering from a right hamstring strain which ruled him out of the game at Lord’s, and it’s yet to be known if he will be in time for the series, which is India’s first trip to play Tests in Sri Lanka after 2017. A return for veteran left-arm spinner Ravindra Jadeja will also be on the cards after he was rested from the one-off game against Afghanistan in New Chandigarh and wasn’t selected for ODIs in England.Meanwhile, the BCCI’s review meeting to dissect the national team’s recent white-ball performances is expected to happen soon once the ongoing T20I series against Zimbabwe is over on Sunday. “Regarding the review meeting, we are going to do it sometime in the beginning of the next month, that is August,” added Saikia.It is understood that top BCCI officials will meet at the headquarters in Mumbai with head coach Gautam Gambhir, T20I captain Shreyas Iyer, Centre of Excellence (COE) head of cricket VVS Laxman, and the five-member selection panel.The review meeting comes after India had T20I series defeats in Ireland (2-0) and England (4-0) before losing the ODI series 2-1. While no knee-jerk changes are expected, it is understood the meeting will address long-term tactical planning, execution of game plans in overseas conditions, and the wider roadmap leading into the 2027 Men’s ODI World Cup.

No flu on our watch’: Dr. Pardiwala details India’s health shield at Glasgow Commonwealth Games

Glasgow: As wet weather and cold temperatures settle over the 2026 Commonwealth Games, India’s Chief Medical Officer, Dr. Dinshaw Pardiwala, has issued a strict health advisory to the Indian contingent.Since upper respiratory infections present a continual threat at major international events, Dr. Pardiwala stressed that strict personal hygiene and preventive care should form India’s first line of defence against possible flu outbreaks.Navigating chilly Scottish conditions is one of the primary hurdles for athletes arriving from warmer climates. To prevent illness before competition even begins, the medical team implemented firm protocols around outdoor exposure and ceremonial duties.

“The weather is cold and it is raining. So the advice is primarily to just protect yourselves, don’t get wet and we are making sure that each of the athletes who doesn’t need to be out, doesn’t need to be out. So try and protect them as far as possible,” Dr. Pardiwala told IANS.“So therefore even in the opening ceremony we made sure that none of the athletes who were participating immediately afterwards were part of the opening ceremony. We don’t want to land up with colds and flus etc. just before participation.”Preventing illness across a multi-sport contingent requires daily vigilance. According to Dr. Pardiwala, simple habits remain the most effective shield against viral spreads in shared athlete facilities.“Just simple health and hygiene, making sure that everyone is keeping their hands clean and hand hygiene is being followed and that is the best way I think to just prevent any outbreak amongst the teams,” he noted. “We get a morning update everyday amongst the Chief Medical Officers of the contingents and fortunately we don’t have any outbreak of any flu or any colds and coughs amongst any of the contingents right now. So that is a good sign and we hope that it continues that way.”

“In most large continental events, usually it is the upper respiratory tract infections that is the biggest blow to athletes performing at their best and fortunately this time it is under control.”To ensure athletes maintain peak physical condition, the Indian Olympic Association (IOA) established an independent, fully equipped sports science and recovery facility directly at the games village.

“You know whenever you have got a large contingent going out for the Olympics or the Asian Games or Commonwealth Games, you need sports science, you need injury management, you need preparation recovery services for the athletes. So what the Indian Olympic Association has done this time again... we have set up a recovery room here for all of our athletes. So all of our athletes will be supported by world class recovery and preparation before their events,” Dr. Pardiwala said.To avoid potential delays in local healthcare systems, the team brought specialized recovery hardware and medical supplies directly from India.“We have got a whole load

Brazil in advanced talks to play international friendly in Kolkata this October:

New Delhi: The Brazilian Football Confederation (CBF) is in late-stage talks with Indian sports organisers to schedule an international friendly in Kolkata, likely happening in early October 2026.

Initial reports from ESPN Brasil, later confirmed by outlets like Estadão, indicate that only the final contractual details are pending before an official announcement.The media outlet also confirmed with the CBF that Brazil plans to hold additional home friendlies in 2027, especially in cities typically overlooked in the national team’s schedule. During the recent World Cup, Kolkata transformed into a lively display with murals of Neymar and Vini Junior adorning the city streets, particularly in north Kolkata.

Although organisers in Bangladesh, Singapore, and Qatar also showed interest, negotiations have only advanced with India. The CBF rejected proposals to include more matches in the region because of squad travel and recovery considerations.The proposed match occurs following Brazil’s elimination by Norway in the Round of 16 at the 2026 FIFA World Cup, under head coach Carlo Ancelotti. This game in Kolkata is the main event of a 16-day “Super FIFA Window” running from late September to early October.

Although authorities in Dhaka, Singapore, and Doha presented lucrative proposals, negotiations with Indian



organizers have skipped over competing bids, moving directly to administrative procedures before the final signature.If confirmed, this event will be Brazil’s first major appearance of the national team in Kolkata, adding to the city’s history of hosting international football legends.If negotiations succeed, Kolkata will rekindle a nearly 50-year-old love affair with South American football. Since Pelé played at Eden Gardens with the New York Cosmos against Mohun Bagan in September 1977, the city has admired Brazilian style.For a region recovering from the post-World Cup slump, the appearance of yellow-and-green jerseys on home soil provides an instant boost.

Jadumani Singh’s 5kg gamble pays off, enters Round of 16

Jadumani Singh had a successful 2025 – a year that was built on his southpaw excellence in the 50kg category. But the men’s boxing weight classes at major amateur events all start at the 55kg category. So the Manipuri boxer made the tough call – a five-kilogram jump in weight and the uncharted territory that comes with it would have to follow. The Commonwealth Games and its lack of seeding would have to be the first major tournament in the weight class.

The 23-year-old boxer turned in a spectacular opening round, one that set the tone for the judges over where this bout was headed, and defeated home favourite Aaron Cullen 5-0 in a unanimous win to start his Commonwealth Games campaign on Friday evening.The lack of seeding meant that what could have been a bout for the later rounds was played out as an opener. In these situations, Indians have struggled, especially after the Tokyo Olympic cycle. But Jadumani fashioned a victory, one which came from an agile lead foot that kept him a moving target for Cullen, and set his lightning-fast left hand.The left hook, followed by a left uppercut, was the bread and butter shot of the Indian. It found its mark in key moments. Cullen responded



with a stinging right jab that found its mark. But on output, the Indian boxer, making his Commonwealth Games debut, was the clearer victor in the first round.The second round, though, is where boxing struggles to survive as a sport. Cullen’s control of the centre of the ring was absolute, and his adjudging of range was precise. When those two conditions were met, his shots landed aplenty. Jadumani changed his stance, deployed himself lower than his stance, and bobbed his head, but was not able to defend that first punch from Cullen’s right. The Scottish boxer made it a close fight in the second, but the Indian got all five judges to give him the round 10-9. That surety on the scorecards was not what was showing in the ring. Jadumani had landed shots, but Cullen surprisingly failed to turn any of the judges’ heads.The third round needed Cullen to produce an extraordinary knockout. But Jadumani coasted through the third, avoiding any heavy shots and preserving his body for the wars to come.

No IOC scrutiny for Infantino over Trump’s intervention at FIFA World Cup

FIFA president Gianni Infantino won’t be investigated by the International Olympic Committee (IOC) for US President Donald Trump’s role in overturning the suspension of an American player after he had received a red card in the previous match, the Olympic body has said. The IOC said that decisions made during the World Cup was beyond its jurisdiction and it hence cannot investigate Infantino’s alleged lack of political neutrality.

The statement comes after a complaint was made by a London-based NGO formally complained to the IOC ethics commission about Infantino. United States forward Folarin Balogun had been handed a red card in their round of 32 match against Bosnia and Herzegovina. However, the mandatory one-game ban was then overturned by FIFA. In the minutes after FIFA announced the decision, reports emerged of Trump having influenced the decision. Trump later admitted to having a conversation with Infantino over telephone to allow Balogun to play in USA’s round of 16 fixture against Belgium, which they lost 4-1.The IOC’s Olympic Charter cites neutrality among “fun-

damental principles of Olympism” for sports bodies like FIFA and its 100-plus members, which has included Infantino since 2020.No formal investigation will be opened, the IOC said, because the complaint by rights group FairSquare did not relate to FIFA’s or Infantino’s specific relations with the Olympic body.The complaint “refers only to (FIFA’s) decisions on its governance and its management, including its relations with government, and to (FIFA’s) implementation of the rules of its sport,” the IOC said in a statement.“Consequently, the complaint falls outside the IOC ethics commission’s jurisdiction,” the statement said.The ethics body does not have independent powers to start investigations and sanction officials, but can make recommendations to the IOC executive board chaired by President Kirsty Coventry. She attended the World Cup final last Sunday at East Rutherford, New Jersey.Action has been taken against just one IOC member in the past eight years for unethical conduct: Sheikh Ahmad al-Fahad al-Sabah, a key power broker who built a reputation as the “kingmaker” of Olympic elections.

After Dhurandhar success, will we never witness Ranveer Singh’s soft boy avatar again?



Last year, in the same week that Ranveer Singh’s watershed spy thriller Dhurandhar released in cinemas, he completed 15 years in the Hindi film industry since the release of his debut movie, Manish Sharma’s 2010 romantic comedy Band Baaja Baaraat. Ranveer’s Dilli ka launda Bittoo Sharma burst onto the screen with his quiet, unassuming charm intact. As Salim-Sulaiman’s “Tarkeebin” played in the background, his silhouette emerged into the sunlight falling in the balcony of a Delhi boys hostel, Ranveer covered his eyes for a few seconds before gingerly letting his eyes face the sun. A cozy stretch followed, as he finally basked in his moment in the sun that he’d been longing for years.

Fifteen years later, as Shashwat Sachdev’s “Ishq Jalakar” blares in the background, Ranveer faces the scorching sun of the Afghanistan desert sun in Aditya Dhar’s Dhurandhar, sporting an unkempt mane and a homogeneous identity, given he’s now a spy obliterating his past identity as he steps into the chopper ferrying him into a new mission — and a whole new life — in Pakistan. Ranveer is no stranger to wiping out his past identity as an actor as well, completely dismantling the image of his previous role to breathe life into a new one. But both in and with Dhurandhar, and its even bigger sequel Dhurandhar 2: The Revenge earlier this year, the stakes are too high now.Ranveer Singh is no longer playing the boy next door, whiling away his time at the corner chai ki thadi snacking and swearing on bread pakoda. He now wolfs down heaps of biryani in his adopted home of Liyari, without realising the tears trickling down his cheek because he’s begun to realise what he’s left behind. He carries the burden of an entire country in the film, and post the unprecedented success of Dhurandhar, also carries with him the burden of a struggling film industry. That’s exactly why when the actor was recently ‘banned’ by a film body, the film industry was set in motion to the rescue of its new saviour.

But in the process, is the industry placing on him too much responsibility? The scale and stake expected from Ranveer now may never allow him to go back to the care-free comic timing of Band Baaja Baarat. Or the quiet strength of Vijay in Vikramaditya Motwane’s 2013 period romance Lootera. Or the kaleidoscopic buffoonery of Sanjay Leela Bhansali’s 2013 romantic drama Goliyon Ki Rasleela: Ram-Leela. Or even the Jim Carrey-style action comedy in the first half of Rohit Shetty’s 2018 cop drama Simmba? Kriti Sanon says she was sidelined in promotions by male actor, given smaller room and car



Kriti Sanon has acknowledged, from her own decade-plus experience in the film industry, how it’s designed to favour men over women, whether it’s in the roles written for the screen or how differently the male and female actors are treated on set. She does maintain that there’s progress now, but back when she started out in 2014, the situation was rather bleak.“When I was starting off, the female character would not be well-defined — What does she do? Where does she come from? Who are her parents? What is her family like? Not much. Sometimes, she’s just the love interest. It’s changing now. Women are choosing meatier parts for themselves. And films were very male-centric. Most of the films even now are. It’s getting better, I’d still say that,” said Kriti.

“And just the little environment on how a man is treated and how a woman is treated. Especially in the beginning, when I was new, I’ve seen it more,” the actor told Lilly Singh.Kriti Sanon admitted there’s resistance on set when a female actor asks too many questions.“I’m known for asking questions to my director on set. I’m curious. I’ve always been. That’s how I’ve grown. I’ve never been trained in acting or done theatre. I’d rather ask questions than be absolutely dumb,” confessed Kriti.“When a man asks questions, he’s really ‘involved.’ So many times, when I suggest something, I’m told, ‘You’re overanalyzing this.’ But when it’d come from the guy, they’d say, ‘Ya, maybe we can do that.’ I said the same thing! I felt that initially,” she added.

Kriti Sanon recalled being given less preferential treatment on a few films, though she’d stand up and not take discrimination most of the times. “Many times, there are small things like the kind of room or car a male actor is given vs the room or car a female actor is given. I don’t care so much about the car and the room, but don’t make me feel less,” argued the actor.“Of course, when it comes to senior actors, I totally get it. But when it’s not so senior,

perfected with as much aplomb — the soft boy presence.

The strategic shift started right after the success of Dhurandhar this past December when he walked out of Farhan Akhtar’s Don 3. He’d signed the film at probably the lowest point of his career, when his films were either underperforming at the box office or getting shelved. While the former starred him as Kabir, an heir to a multi-crore Delhi empire, the latter traced his character Murad’s rise from the streets of Mumbai to a self-made rapper. But what bridged both the performances were the scenes and moments where he spoke volumes with his character. We’ve seen him bring the house down at Bollywood parties and weddings. We’ve also seen him dazzle the red carpet in signature Sindhi out-there looks, but he put all of that unhinged energy and aesthetic aside to downplay his parts in both the films, allowing his character to take the forefront. In fact, we barely notice him in the opening scene of Gully Boy, as he let Vijay Varma’s Moeen own the main character energy.Had both Dhurandhar films been one as originally planned, it’d have been interesting to observe the inflexion point in his character arc, from being strategically relegated to the background in the first to taking over the Karachi throne in the second. But by splitting the film into two parts, Aditya Dhar has fed into the rising monolithic myth of Ranveer Singh on the big screen. Even in his personal life, despite becoming a father, he’s kept his infectious joy and energy at bay. He’s doing what he’s shied away from doing all his career — keep a low profile. Wearing a mask while visiting Hansal Mehta’s office for his next, evading the paparazzi without as much of an acknowledgement, and even giving up on brands in order to shape his own are practices the old Ranveer Singh may not approve of.

Remember the time when he made even a packaged noodles commercial his own by collaborating on it with director Rohit Shetty like it’s a tentpole film? Or when he collaborated with adult star Johnny Sins for the most fun condom commercial? Or when he bared it all for a magazine cover shoot? Or even he donned padded underwear to accentuate his assets in Aditya Chopra’s 2016 rom-com Befikre? Risqué may have become risky now for Ranveer, who’s now endorsing much bigger brands like RuPay and Dubai Tourism, which also match his newfound stature.Is it true then that Ranveer Singh charming his way into our hearts with Rocky Randhawa will be the last we see of him in that light? Will we no longer see him make fun of Akshay Kumar’s readiness to dance at a mundan ceremony because he himself has joined the senior actor as a brand ambassador of Naya Bharat? Will he be now playing only his songs during the baaraat ceremony of the next Ambani wedding, instead of giving shoutout to his idols in attendance, playing their signature songs as the unofficial DJ, and dancing along the beats like a hopeless fan? If a video clip of him mimicking Shreya Ghoshal singing “Lattoo” from April 2026 is to be believed, Ranveer is still the same soft boy with a softer heart.

even the ADs (assistant directors) have the tendency of calling the girl to the set first. But is he (male actor) ready? Because if he’s not ready, why are you calling me to the set right now? I feel people don’t even realise they’re a little more scared of the actor’s timings than the female actor’s. Sometimes, female actors can be taken for granted,” added Kriti.Lilly Singh recalled her own incident of being a junior artiste on the set of Anees Bazmee’s 2011 romantic comedy Thank You, starring Akshay Kumar and Sonam Kapoor. When Sonam wanted to take a pee break, she was repeatedly asked to wait for Akshay to show up for their shot together, for the next 20 minutes, only for her to look at Lilly, whom she didn’t even know personally back then, and say, “See, this is a man’s world.”Kriti argued that she’d just go to the washroom as and when needed, signalling that there’s been a change on film sets over the years, where women actors are putting their foot down. “I feel gender discrimination bothers me for days if I don’t stand up for myself. There have been times when I felt less valued, I reached a point where I did stand up for myself,” she admitted.

Kriti Sanon also recalled during the promotions of a film, the male actor would decide where she should get involved during the promotions. “I found that so weird and almost disrespectful that I felt if you don’t need me for promotions, then you should promote the film alone. Then I just stepped back,” revealed Kriti. But after an earnest request from the director, she did participate in a promotional event because she’s “ethical at the core” and it wasn’t the director’s “fault.” “But a lot of it, I just backed out,” confessed the actor.Kriti made her acting debut with Sukumar’s 2014 Telugu psychological action thriller 1: Nenokkadine opposite Mahesh Babu. Later that year, she made her Bollywood debut with Sabbir Khan’s action romance Heropanti opposite Tiger Shroff. Since then, she’s appeared in tentpole films like Rohit Shetty’s 2015 action romance Dilwale opposite Varun Dhawan, and Dinesh Vijan’s 2017 romantic fantasy Raabta opposite Sushant Singh Rajput.

‘Jaswant Singh Khalsa abducted again’: Kunal Kamra questions CBFC over Satluj OTT removal



Diljit Dosanjh-starrer Satluj battled censorship issues for over three years in its bid for a theatrical release. However, the film never made it to the big screen. Instead, it quietly premiered on ZEE5 last Friday in its uncut version. By Sunday evening, it had been removed from the streaming platform, sparking outrage online and reigniting the debate around censorship in India. The latest to criticise the move is comedian Kunal Kamra, who penned an open note to CBFC chairperson Prasoon Joshi.Addressing Joshi, Kamra wrote, “Can you please enlighten us on why 127 cuts were recommended for the film Punjab ’95? The same film, now renamed Satluj, has been taken down from an OTT platform in less than two days. The CBFC has no jurisdiction over OTT platforms or international releases.”

He further added, “Punjab ’95 tells the story of Jaswant Singh Khalsa, a man who exposed documented human rights abuses and paid for it with his life. If a film based on documented facts cannot be seen by Indian audiences, then the public deserves to know why. This sends a very direct message to filmmakers and production companies: if you’re paying homage to a great personality from a minority community, you’ll have to face a CBFC.”Red carpet for The Kashmir Files but not SatlujKunal Kamra also questioned what he called the censor board’s double standards. “Journalists should be asking the people running this censor board some hard

We remain committed to exploring every appropriate avenue through due process to bring the film back to our audiences at the earliest opportunity.”Diljit Dosanjh had hinted that such a move was possibleDuring an Instagram Live session, Diljit Dosanjh said, “See, our film has released. Where we want the conversation to reach, it’s bound to reach there. Those who haven’t watched it yet, do that as soon as you can. Just understand what I’m trying to say.”He added that the film could disappear at any moment. “It can happen. There’s that fear. Today is Saturday. It could be pulled down by Monday. But let’s not worry. You can download the film till now. Those who want to stop the film can do that. Those who want to take panga can do that. There’s no tension.”In another social media post, Diljit wrote, “What happened to Satluj is exactly what had happened to Jaswant Singh Khalsa.”Satluj, previously titled Punjab 95, had remained stuck with the CBFC for years after the board reportedly recommended over 127 cuts before granting certification. Despite the matter reaching the courts, the impasse remained unresolved, ultimately prompting the makers to opt for an unannounced OTT release in its original, uncut form.
